





President's Message

There are three stories in this message. The first is an update on Li Chiang Chu's Scholarships. Li designed an endowment that required FWS to actively engage with very recent graduates. We are now doing what she herself regularly did on her own initiative, namely find those Woodstock graduates that are not US or Canadian citizens who are in need of supplemental financial support to complete their degrees at Colleges and Universities in Canada and the USA. In just over a year, FWS has developed an application and assessment process and our Board has awarded four scholarships. FWS is fulfilling Li Chiang Chu's vision and by so doing changing part of our focus and effort. The message is FWS listens carefully to donors and then implements their intentions.

The second story has to do with the value of friendship in our School "family." This last Fall my classmates with treasured spouses, friends and teenage grandchildren returned to Woodstock 50 years after graduation to spend three emotionally full days on Campus and the hillside. Then we were off for two plus glorious weeks in India. In our trekking and traveling we found endless topics to discuss, to laugh about and carefully listen to. I think Barry Gilmore described what we experienced after his joining the 2016 FWS Yosemite Alumni Enrichment trip when he wrote that intensely being with alumni or classmates "can refill a hole that we are not fully aware existed." We all start off as students, parents, teachers or friends at Woodstock but in our respective North American realities we add maturity, fascinating skills, and new stories just waiting to be heard by our School or Class "family." Many of us nourish this "family" of Woodstock School connections in class gatherings, by volunteering for local committees for the Regional Clubs or for the Annual Meetings, by being FWS Board Members or by taking on the often lifetime role of class secretaries. We can tell the more recent graduates there is a rich swath of authentic friendships in this "family" just waiting to be enjoyed or to support you when you need it most. The message is that friendship between alumni, staff, parents, and friends is a firm foundation to build a legacy that includes improving the School for its current students.

The third story is progress on Woodstock's Campus Master Plan. All that attended the Boston Annual Meeting last year heard and saw some initial drawings and estimate costs of the School's plans. The intent was and is building and refurbishing of the academic core of the School and continuing the improvements needed for staff housing. The Woodstock School Board approved two projects in its April 2018 meeting. Design work by Sanjay Narang's firm MARS has started on the complicated design of the Tehri View site from a hillside residence to a new science building. Regulatory permits and design iterations will follow. Funding will come from a pledge from Rick Downs, a match from FWS and reserved funds from Woodstock School. TZ Chu's bequest can be used for equipment that goes into the labs. We will all be tracking this building in the next 18 to 24 months. The second project is the exciting rebuilding of Tafton into the Centre for Imagination (CFI). It has already gone through several refining design iterations and has just been approved by the Woodstock Board to proceed with its regulatory permitting. FWS, in response to the Woodstock School Board, has accepted the challenge to fund this project. We already have a wide swath of both large and small donations from North American Alumni. Several classes are working on this as a Class fundraising project. FWS Board Members have donated funds and FWS has voted to match dollar for dollar all North American donations to the CFI. Our goal is to have this \$300,000 project fully funded by North American alumni when we meet in Chicago in July 2018. We still need donors to reach our goal. The message is that the North American alumni through FWS allows us all to be a principal funding source for both projects.

This is my last Message as President in an Annual Report. Please continue to support all the Board members who put in long hours and travel at their own expense to make this Foundation vital. It is much more than a 501(c)(3), it is a Foundation built on friendships that run through our School "family."

FRIENDS OF WOODSTOCK SCHOOL | GRANTS TO WOODSTOCK

The FWS Board of Directors reviews and approves all grants made from its designated and undesignated funds. Grants made in FY 2016-2017 total \$204,318.

DESIGNATED GRANTS

The following Designated Grants were made to enhance programs and facilities at Woodstock School:

Woodstock School Science, Math, and Computer Departments | \$81,715

Funded by the FWS Science Fund for the purchase of equipment and teaching aids to strengthen the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) program of Woodstock's Science Department, and to fund the cost for Woodstock teachers, staff and students to attend various field trips and educational programs.

Highlights include:

- Funding the STEM Coordinator position. Building on her experience in New Zealand, Christine Anderson, Woodstock's Stem Coordinator is responsible for assisting in the development, implementation and monitoring of the STEM program within the School's curriculum as well as developing STEM initiatives and educational opportunities.
- Funding the travel cost for the Woodstock School robotics team to participate in the World Robotics Olympiad in Mumbai.
- Funding the travel cost for the Woodstock School Math Department students to participate in the NEAMC (Northeast Asia Mathematics Competition) annual international mathematic competition in Tokyo, Japan.
- Funding the travel cost for Woodstock School physics teachers and students to visit CERN (Conseil Européen pour la Recherche Nucléaire), the European Laboratory for Particle Physics and home of the LHC (Large Hadron Collider), the world's largest and most powerful particle accelerator in Geneva, Switzerland.
- Funding a visit by CLEAPPS (Consortium of Local Education Authorities for the Provision of Science Services) staff to perform a Science Department educational audit. CLEAPPS is a United Kingdom based organization that promotes excellence in science education and offers consulting and training for teachers and heads of departments as well as audit services on aspects around the safety and ergonomics of teaching laboratories.

- Funding the travel cost for three Woodstock science teachers to attend a professional development program in STEM education at the Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff, Arizona.
- Purchase of Science Department equipment and teaching aids.

2017 Mussoorie Mountain Festival | \$50,000

The 2017 Mussoorie Mountain Festival was held at Woodstock School in May 2017. The theme was "Conservation" as it relates to the Himalaya. 12 distinguished speakers presented at the festival, and for the first time, six senior Woodstock students presented as a part of the School's Festival of Ideas. Two exhibitions were held, and a music concert was held in the newly renovated Quad Cafeteria. An estimated 200 Woodstock students attended each of the sessions.

The Luminescence Fund at Woodstock | \$1,733





PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

2017 Annual Meeting and Reunion – Babson College’s Executive Conference Center, Wellesley, Massachusetts

A beautiful setting, terrific program, enthusiastic alumni, staff and friends – what a wonderful venue for this year’s event with many thanks to Rick Downs ’79 for partially underwriting our use of this elegant conference center. 2017’s theme was Landslides, Pushtas, and Paths: Breaking the Mold. For over 160 years, Woodstock has dealt with seasonal and cultural shifts by building sturdier pushtas, redirecting its educational path, and keeping the School physically perched on the rugged hillside of Mussoorie.

Friday evening included presentation of the Glenn Conrad Volunteer Service Award to Anne Lind, a delicious New England Clambake and Seafood Dinner, and a challenging discussion by Jeet Singh ’81 titled, Secondary Education is Failing our Youth: How will we change this? Jeet and some of The Singhs Band provided Friday evening’s after dark entertainment.

Woodstock’s plans to break some of its own molds were presented at an inspirational keynote address Saturday morning by Dr. Jonathan Long showcasing the new Campus Master Plan with additional presentations by Chief Operating Officer, Sanjeev Puri; Director of the Centre for Imagination, Amy Seefeldt; and Director of Alumni Affairs, Lauri Coulter ’81. The breakout sessions were significant and included:

- A Q and A session about the Campus Master Plan, continuing the conversation from the keynote address with Jonathan Long, Sanjeev Puri, and Lauri Coulter.
- Woodstock’s Alumni Connect Professional and Mentoring Network, presented by Lauri Coulter and in place through Woodstock’s Alumni Office. It is a digital online platform exclusively for WS alumni and former staff that connects with LinkedIn and Facebook. Inside the network you can share photos, be a mentor or mentee, and post or search for internships or potential job opportunities.
- Inclusivity - Life after Woodstock, led by David Weidman ’75 to increase dialogue and communication on the diversity of human relationships, sexual orientation, and the definition of family. Panel participants included Chad Kammin, former staff, Gayatri Patnaik ’86, and Marilyn Webster ’81.
- Alumni on the Frontiers, conversations with recent alumni Kilang Yanger, ’02, Dorien Ediger-Seto ’79, and Shruti Ganguly ’00, all who are in cutting edge professions including stem cell research, immigration legal defense, and film production.

- Linking Poor Working Women around the World, presented by Marty Alter Chen ’60 about the economic empowerment of poor women in villages and urban settlements across Bangladesh and India in the 1970s and 1980s, and her leadership since 1997 of a global network of organizations of working poor women called, Women in Informal Employment: Globalizing and Organizing.
- Transplanting Yoga, Ayurvedic Medicine and Mindfulness, led by Mark Wagner ’67 and demonstrating how these practices are being adapted as effective self-health regimens in managing our daily stress-filled lives.
- Collecting our Stories, presented by Bruce Browne ’70 and inspiring those who attended to capture half-remembered stories and bring them to the present through demonstrated techniques, settings, questions, and tools to assist this important task.
- Well-Traveled Alumni Series, Myanmar – A Journey of Discovery, presented by Yasmin Padamsee ’87 with a pictorial journey from 2009 and a dictatorship-led Myanmar to November 2015 when Aung San Suu Kyi led her party to a majority win in Myanmar’s first openly contested election in 25 years.

So many choices and such amazing presenters for each session!

Saturday night’s delicious and sumptuously decorated Bara Hindustani Khana was followed by the Mountain Home Companion Talent Show and Live Auction. Scholarships

FWS Merit Scholarships and SAGE-Woodstock Scholarships are funded from donations to our General Scholarship Fund. Merit Scholarships are intended for students demonstrating meritorious achievement in academic work, the arts, leadership, service activities, or other priority areas identified by the School. Merit candidates can come from any country or background. SAGE-Woodstock Scholarships benefit students from North America with a priority for students with a Woodstock alumni connection who are currently attending public schools and meet the School's academic and other admissions standards. Both types of scholarships are vital tools for FWS to support Woodstock's diversity goals.



- Three students received Merit Scholarships.
- Additionally, six students benefited from five separate scholarship endowment funds.

FWS Science Grants Fund

- 32 boxes of equipment have been consolidated and shipped from FWS to Woodstock and continue to be shipped, to date. Stephen Anderson, Head of Science provides detailed spreadsheets for science equipment orders and David Wheeler, FWS Business Manager purchases and coordinates the orders which are delivered to FWS, inventoried, and then shipped to the School.
- The Fund has paid for alumni, scholars, and distinguished visitors accomplished in mathematics, physical, biological, and computer sciences to come to Woodstock for academic lectures. Qualified Woodstock teachers are funded for college level AP course instruction and symposia to enhance their knowledge and enable them to remain current with progress in the science and math.
- Other items consistent with the science and math department's long-range plans are also supported.



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TREASURER'S REPORT

2017 was a positive year for FWS from a fiscal perspective. While unrestricted donations remained even over the prior year, restricted contributions earned were in excess of \$1,200,000; highlighted by large one-time contributions from TZ Chu to help establish a Science, Math and Computer Science Fund and Li-chiang Chu's launch of a new scholarship endowment. Overall donations, both unrestricted and restricted were \$1,057,297 more than the prior year. This figure does not include the gains achieved through FWS's investment portfolio, where FWS earned gains from income and capital appreciation totaling \$457,805 over a loss of \$35,920 in the prior year.

Overall, in FY 2017 FWS earned \$1,744,258 in Revenues, comprised of \$1,275,403 from Donor Contributions and fees for its Annual Meeting, and \$132,462 in other revenue, interest and dividends earned from our investment portfolio, with net investment gains of \$336,393. This represents an increase of \$1,548,460 from FY 2016, where revenues totaled \$195,798, comprised of \$227,498 from Donor Contributions and fees for its Annual Meeting, \$86,427 in other revenue, interest and dividends, and net realized and unrealized investment losses of \$118,087.

During FY 2017, Operating Expenses were \$239,954, divided between the cost of the Annual Meeting, Programs, Administration, and Fundraising. This represents an \$8,354 incremental cost incurred over FY 2016 where Operating Expenses were \$231,600. Grants to Woodstock also increased in FY 2017 by almost \$48,401 (\$217,890 in FY 2017 compared to \$169,489 in FY 2016).

Overall net assets increased by \$1,286,414 compared to decrease in net assets of \$205,291 in FY 2016.

FWS is pleased to announce that it now has a sister organization – Canadian Friends of Woodstock School. The Canadian Friends is a registered charity in Canada, and is now able to give tax receipts to Canadian donors. The Canadian Friends will fund projects at Woodstock, when requested by the Woodstock Board of Directors and approved by the Board of the Canadian Friends. The Board of the Canadian Friends currently consists of myself, Marlin Schoonmaker, Tom Carter and Alan Howard although we are looking for more board members, preferably Canadian residents. When FWS offers to match donations for designated projects to all North American members that will apply to donations to Canadian Friends that are sent to Woodstock School for such projects. For further details on donating to the Canadian Friends, please contact the FWS office.

As you will note from the President's Report, FWS is committing to fund substantial projects related to the Campus Master Plan over the coming years. Much of this funding will come from FWS's unrestricted, invested funds, and depleting these funds will deprive FWS of the returns from those funds that we have been using to support our operations. As such, FWS will need to think about uncovering new sources of funds or reducing expenses over the coming years.
